There are two Diocesan conventions this year. The first being to vote for the new Bishop. It will be held September 30, 2023. Walk-abouts (a.k.a. get to know the candidates) will be held September 11th-15th. The second convention will be held on November 11, 2023 in Portsmouth, OH. The delegates attending these important events are: John Spain, Tony Nagygyor, Dorothy Powell, Kathy Doane. In the event someone cannot attend, Tom Carter and Deneen Trombetti are alternates to serve in one's place.

Johnny Arguedas moved to approve the slate of new Vestry members and convention attendees. Chris Denhart 2<sup>nd</sup> the motion. All passed with no opposition.

- BUDGET PRESENTATION & FINANCE REPORT Mackenzie Hammel presented the budget noting it is pretty much balanced except for about \$1500 which we are hoping will be covered by some increased plate offerings and additional pledges. She noted we are moving in the right direction as we had an increase of \$1100 in pledges this year from the previous year. A goal is to become completely self-sustainable to cover all of Meredith's salary which is currently being supplemented by the Bishop. The Vestry voted to pass the proposed budget.
  More discussion was had on the financial status of the church
  - about current loans, space leasing, and other opportunities for income (i.e. credit card pledgers absorb the % bank fee.) A motion to accept was offered. Jan Kennedy moved, Ron Murphy 2<sup>nd</sup> the motion. Passed with no opposition.
- QUICK Q&A A question was asked about intinction coming back. Meredith explained why it had been removed. Discussion was had of perhaps having 2 different chalices, one for intinction and one for drinking from the cup. Options will continue to be explored.

## Priest-in-Charge Report

Dear Saints,

What a year we've had together! As I was compiling this report and scrolling through my phone to find pictures from 2023, I almost couldn't believe that some of these events actually happened this last year... I kept thinking, "surely, it was longer ago than that?!" We've fit in so much life together over these past 12 months.

As I shared with all of you in my Annual Report last year, 2023 was an important year in the life of my family, as Jackson finished his medical residency and began a new fellowship at UC Health. Knowing that we would have the pleasure of serving alongside this community beyond what we had initially imagined has been a great gift to us, and living among you in the neighborhood of Pleasant Ridge has been an absolute joy. I love running into you at Cafe Alma, honking and waving at your children as I drive past PRM during school dismissal, and seeing many of you so often in my day-to-day life.

Most of you know that during my first week of ministry at All Saints, I had the opportunity to give a blessing to Johnny and Nicki's youngest daughter, Inez. On the porch that October morning, we all stood googly-eyed around their precious newborn baby girl. Now that little girl is hardly a baby! Inez is walking and talking and ready to take on the world. When I'm looking for a representation of my time at All Saints so far, I always look to Inez. After 2.5 years with you, I feel like I finally have my footing as your Priest-in-Charge. I've been grateful for the many ways in which my own gifts for ministry have been in perfect step with the needs of our community during this particular moment in time. But the truth is, I'm still learning. Your constant grace and compassion, as I inevitably make mistakes along the way, has meant a great deal to me.

Like last year, 2023 was a time of much change for our community. We watched as several beloved longtime parishioners passed away or moved away. We said goodbye to our Organist of over 30 years, Marianne. We even put up a mural over our basement walls which were last painted by our beloved Julie Chaney's father twenty-something years ago. In the midst of so much change, I've been especially mindful of the small but mighty group of households that have been with All Saints for some time. This faithful bunch has seen our church ebb and flow through the years. In some small parish communities, growth like what we've seen might be difficult for folks who've been around for a while to embrace. But not at All Saints. Those who've seen this place through many seasons have remained the biggest cheerleaders for all that this community is being called to become.

This past year, not only did we welcome our talented new Director of Music Ministry, Ethan Neal, but with open arms our parish received 12 new households into our community. A majority of those households included children, which excites me beyond measure. What a gift to see the future of our parish in the pews week after week! It's also been the case that many of these newcomers have found All Saints to be a place of refuge and comfort from past religious hurt. Over and over again, I continually hear from newcomers how amazed they are at your authenticity and hospitality. In a world with lots of prickly places, you have become a soft and safe place for so many people to land. That's just who you are, Saints... and I am so very thankful that you continue to entrust me with the honor of serving as your priest.

May we persevere in seeking out God's call for us in this new year, and may God continue to bless us along the way.

## Senior Warden's Report

With every year that passes I'm evermore amazed at the beauty of this All Saints community that we all love and co-create. It is a great source of inspiration, hope, and refreshment to many both inside our chapel on Sunday mornings and in the larger community. I am thankful for everything each and everyone of you do to sustain and nourish our parish, especially to those community leaders on vestry, on staff, and at large who take ownership for the church's development and operation. A special call-out must be given to our beloved priest Meredith who pours ceaselessly out not only her time but also her spirit. Most of all though I am grateful to God for his many blessings he's given this church; which like many things he blesses, may be small in size but is mighty in spirit.

As a church this has been quite the year, here is a selection of major happenings:

- A remodeling of the basement was completed, thanks to the gifts of many, allowing for the All Saints children program to expand into full use of the space
- Julie's role as children's ministry director was made permanent, and during her first full year in the role has led countless events and activities for our children. Our increased children's programing has been funded by the first year of a 3-year COCL grant.
- The first ever Summer Saints kid's camp was completed, amplifying our outreach in the community. The program was primarily supported via a special diocesean grant.
- After nearly 30 years our cherished musical director Marianne retired at the end of August.
- We welcomed Ethan Neal, a CCM master's student, as our new musical director in late August. In his tenure the All Saints choir has returned to weekly rehearsal and regular performances for the first time since Covid.
- Outside musicians have been brought in throughout the year to enhance the All Saints music experience using 1st year funding from a 3-yr COCL grant.
- Maintenance work was complete to repair both the primary set of stairs leading into the sanctuary as well as the set of stairs directly by the street near the magnolia tree.
- Countless fellowship events including a regular get-together called "Saints & Sinners".

I am incredibly excited about what the future holds for All Saints, made possible by the great gifts of time, talent, and treasure the faithful of this church have given over the years. As you go on to review the budget for 2024 later in this report, note that while there is much to do to reach self-sufficiency, we can have confidence because the people of All Saints have stepped up time and time again. It will be a journey to get there, which each of us will need to be a part of, but know that many, including the diocese, are heavily invested in our success.

"Almighty and everliving God, source of all wisdom and understanding, be present with those who take counsel in All Saints for the renewal and mission of your Church. Teach us in all things to seek first your honor and glory. Guide us to perceive what is right, and grant us both the courage to pursue it and the grace to accomplish it; thorough Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen."

## Junior Warden's Report

The greatest joy of being Junior Warden this past year has been the opportunity to get to know many of you so much better. Whether sharing a bagel or a beer, our conversations have informed and inspired me. I move into the Senior Warden role this year with a renewed appreciation for the blessing that is All Saints and the community God has created here.

2023 was a banner year for Outreach Ministry at All Saints. Our growing list of events connected our All Saints community with our neighbors and beyond in new, exciting and meaningful ways.

For the second year, our nave was transformed into a performance space for two concerts by the 4-Way Quartet, a professional string quartet committed to providing free lessons to underserved children at Norwood middle and high schools. As word has spread, their following has grown and each concert introduced more people to the warmth and hospitality that is All Saints.

August saw the return of Ridge Day, an annual festival celebrating the Pleasant Ridge neighborhood. All Saints front lawn was the start and finish of a one-mile Fun Run for kids sponsored by Community Happens Here. Later that day, All Saints volunteers manned a booth at the festival, connecting with festival goers, handing out bubble wands and applying dozens of temporary tattoos.

In September, an old All Saints tradition was reborn: a Community Dinner, cohosted with our neighbor, Community Happens Here. More than 50 people, half from outside our All Saints community, enjoyed an evening of a great food and wonderful fellowship in the Parish Hall. Thanks to the generosity of our All Saints community, we were, once again, able to provide backpacks filled with supplies for 12 Norwood elementary schoolchildren at the beginning of the school year.

Other popular annual events included the pet blessing in October and passing out candy and treats to our neighbors on Halloween. We also continue to be a valuable resource for the community by providing space at below market rate for Baldwin Music Education Center, a tai chi class, and Girl Scout Troop 45041. In December, we formed a new partnership With Woodford Academy in Kennedy Heights, collecting funds for gift cards that school administrators handed out to families in need during the holidays.

## Children & Family MinistryReport

2023 was a year of growth for our children's programming. Thanks to a grant received in 2022 from the diocese we were able to renovate the children's space in the lower level of the church as well as hire staff to run the program. Thanks to a parishioner's generous donation we were able to go the extra mile and make all necessary renovations to the space, including new ceiling tiles, baseboards and fresh paint throughout the area. The children moved into the new space in April and are now welcomed each Sunday by a bright and cheerful place all their own. We offer both nursery care for ages 0-3 as well as Junior Saints, a Montessori based program for children ages 4+. We also offer once-monthly family gatherings which have included a family worship service, book reading, and travelling to Procter Center for their Advent wreath event.

In June we started a new program called Summer Saints. It was a low cost, funfilled summer program for the children of our parish as well as our neighboring community. We enjoyed days that included morning worship, crafts, gardening, games, and cooking healthy meals from scratch. Summer Saints created an opportunity to make new friends and strengthen bonds within our community, all while giving the children the chance to try lots of new experiences. Several children have said the program was the highlight of their summer. We received two additional grants to help cover the expense of Summer Saints.

The highlight of the year happened in December with the return of the much loved All Saints Christmas Pageant. We had record attendance as families and friends came to enjoy the children's telling of the birth of Jesus. Thank you to all who helped make this happen - from rehearsing lines to baking cookies to gluing batting on sheep costumes there was a lot that happened behind the scenes to make our pageant such a huge success.

A special thank you to Chris Meshot and Mary Taflinger for their support of our program this past year. Chris helped get the downstairs space ready for the children, repairing more things than I can even mention. He built the sets for our pageant as well as set up the microphone I realized at the last minute we so desperately needed. Mary helped with Summer Saints, sharing her gardening gifts each week with the children. She also helped lead the pageant and made many new costumes this year, which allowed our parent shepherds to dress the part along with their children!

## Music Ministry Report

This gift is not taken lightly as a set of this capacity is worth approximately \$30,000. We are ever grateful for this wonderful addition to our ministry and look forward to creative ways to use them in the service.

Moving forward with this ever-developing ministry, we hope to reach out beyond the walls of All Saints and minister to the greater community, hosting recitals, concerts, worship, and events to help further the missions of All Saints and strengthen our community partnerships. ## Building and Grounds Report

The below list of items that need some planning and thoughts on are listed below: I've prioritized the below list of projects A, B, and C.

- A) Re-grouting and re-setting of entry steps leading into the sanctuary(main entrance). COMPLETED 2023
- B) Installing a dedicated outlet to help alleviate potential freeze/thaw leakage into parish hall. A
- C) Remove all non-functioning boiler parts including piping currently in the basement. C
- D) Clean all gutters on entire property a min. of two times per year. Spring and late fall after all tree leaves are down. A
- E) Waterproof and stop all leakage into the room behind the wall where new heating units were installed as the ducts are almost resting on the floor and long term rusting and deterioration of those new heaters will be compromised if leakage from rain/snow continue to enter that space.B
- F) Exterior trim painting needed especially on the wood framed areas of the building.B
- G) Replace all non-functioning light bulbs in chancel and sanctuary with LED bulbs. A
- H) Replace deteriorated steps in the front of the sanctuary by the front tree that is climbed by the children. COMPLETED 2023
- I) Remove existing tree in the rear of the sanctuary that pose a threat should it fall. B
- J) Once it has been determined that window wells are no longer a threat of leakage through the downspouts/drains remove previously installed coverings of membrane and wood framing which will add good light to the Baldwin space. B
- K) Repair all broken down plumbing lines buried below grade in front of parish hall and plumbing line adjacent to main entrance into the sanctuary. B
- L) Repair/Remove white concrete entrance by the red door on the right side where the mailbox is located. C
- M) Recommend replacing existing shed in the rear of building that would be at least 2-3 times larger than current shed. C
- N) Repair existing driveway drain in the rear of the sanctuary as it i continually clogs and is a slip hazard for Baldwin clients when the drain clogs with vegetation and dirt.B
- O) Finish replacing all remaining deteriorated windows that are costing us heating and cooling dollars. COMPLETED 2023
- P) Cleaning of walls in the sanctuary that show dirt stains and potential interior paint project of sanctuary.B
- Q) Clean and reglaze plexiglass protecting stained glass windows as necessary.B

# Financial Report & Proposed 2024 Budget

2023 was a bit of a challenging year for All Saints financially. Like many businesses and individuals, we faced increasing costs, most notably in the areas of Church Insurance and Diocesan Assessment payments. As a result, although we had strong parishioner contributions and received some support from the Diocese of Southern Ohio (covering a portion of Meredith's Salary/Benefits and our Children's/Music Programs), we faced an overall deficit of -\$10,076. Although we had originally planned for a balanced budget in 2023, our Diocesan Assessment/Church Insurance payments ended up being \$6K/\$2.5K higher than expected, driving the majority of our deficit.

Turning to our 2024 budget, our Church Insurance and Diocesan Assessment cost challenges remain. Additionally, although we've continued to see a much-appreciated increase in our number of pledging households, our overall dollars pledged are down ~\$20K compared to 2023 as some of our highest-pledging households have left the church (through death, moving, etc.). As a result, our 2024 budget currently stands at a deficit of ~\$36,868. Although challenging, we are hopeful that, with your help, we can begin chipping away at our deficit through a combination of increased dollars pledged per household, creative fundraiser and/or expense reduction ideas, and continued increases in our number of pledging households. Together, we can do great things and continue to grow and cultivate our wonderful community. Thanks for all that you have done and continue to do to support All Saints!
