First Reading

Mark 11:1-11

When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately.'" They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting,

> "Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David! Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.



The Liturgy of the Word

Second Reading

Hymn 154

Philippians 2:5-11

Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death-- even death on a cross. Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

MUSICAL INTERLUDE

The Passion Reading based on Mark 14:32-15:7

NARRATOR	Then they went to a place called Gethsemane; and he said to his disciples,
JESUS	"Sit here while I pray."
NARRATOR	He took with him Peter and James and John, and began to be distressed and agitated. And he said to them,
JESUS	"I am deeply grieved, even to death; remain here, and keep awake."
NARRATOR	And going a little farther, he threw himself on the ground and prayed that, if it were possible, the hour might pass from him. He said,
JESUS	"Abba, Father, for you all things are possible; remove this cup from me; yet, not what I want, but what you want."
NARRATOR	He came and found them sleeping; and he said to Peter,
JESUS	"Simon, are you asleep? Could you not keep awake one hour? Keep awake and pray that

	you may not come into the time of trial; the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak."
NARRATOR	And again he went away and prayed, saying the same words. And once more he came and found them sleeping, for their eyes were very heavy; and they did not know what to say to him. He came a third time and said to them,
JESUS	"Are you still sleeping and taking your rest? Enough! The hour has come; the Son of Man is betrayed into the hands of sinners. Get up, let us be going. See, my betrayer is at hand."
NARRATOR	Immediately, while he was still speaking, Judas, one of the twelve, arrived; and with him there was a crowd with swords and clubs, from the chief priests, the scribes, and the elders. Now the betrayer had given them a sign, saying,
CONGREGATION	"The one I will kiss is the man; arrest him and lead him away under guard."
NARRATOR	
	So when he came, he went up to him at once and said,
CONGREGATION	and said,
	and said,
CONGREGATION	and said, "Rabbi!" and kissed him. Then they laid hands on him and arrested him. But one of those who stood near drew his sword and struck the slave of the high priest, cutting off his ear. Then Jesus

	assembled. Peter had followed him at a distance, right into the courtyard of the high priest; and he was sitting with the guards, warming himself at the fire. Now the chief priests and the whole council were looking for testimony against Jesus to put him to death; but they found none. For many gave false
	testimony against him, and their testimony did not agree. Some stood up and gave false testimony against him, saying,
CONGREGATION	"We heard him say, 'I will destroy this temple that is made with hands, and in three days I will build another, not made with hands."
NARRATOR	But even on this point their testimony did not agree. Then the high priest stood up before them and asked Jesus,
CONGREGATION	"Have you no answer? What is it that they testify against you?"
NARRATOR	But he was silent and did not answer. Again the high priest asked him,
CONGREGATION	Are you the Messiah, the Son of the Blessed One?"
NARRATOR	Jesus said,
JESUS	"I am; and 'you will see the Son of Man seated at the right hand of the Power,' and 'coming with the clouds of heaven.""
NARRATOR	Then the high priest tore his clothes and said,
CONGREGATION	"Why do we still need witnesses? You have heard his blasphemy! What is your decision?"
NARRATOR	All of them condemned him as deserving death. Some began to spit on him, to blindfold him, and to strike him. The guards also took him over and beat him. While Peter

CONGREGATION	was below in the courtyard, one of the servant-girls of the high priest came by. When she saw Peter warming himself, she stared at him and said, "You also were with Jesus, the man from Nazareth." But he denied it, saying, "I do not know or understand what you
	are talking about."
NARRATOR	And he went out into the forecourt. Then the cock crowed. And the servant-girl, on seeing him, began again to say to the bystanders, "This man is one of them." But again he denied it. Then after a little while the bystanders again said to Peter, "Certainly you are one of them; for you are a Galilean." But he began to curse, and he swore an oath,
CONGREGATION	"I do not know this man you are talking
	about."
NARRATOR	At that moment the cock crowed for the second time. Then Peter remembered that Jesus had said to him,
JESUS	"Before the cock crows twice, you will deny
	me three times."
NARRATOR	And he broke down and wept. As soon as it was morning, the chief priests held a consultation with the elders and scribes and the whole council. They bound Jesus, led him away, and handed him over to Pilate. Pilate asked him,
CONGREGATION	"Are you the King of the Jews?"
NARRATOR	He answered him,
JESUS	"You say so."
NARRATOR	Then the chief priests accused him of many things. Pilate asked him again,

CONGREGATION "Have you no answer? See how many

charges they bring against you."

NARRATOR	But Jesus made no further reply, so that Pilate
	was amazed. Now at the festival he used to
	release a prisoner for them, anyone for whom
	they asked. Now a man called Barabbas was in
	prison with the rebels who had committed
	murder during the insurrection. So the crowd
	came and began to ask Pilate to do for them
	according to his custom. Then he answered
	them.

CONGREGATION "Do you want me to release for you the King of the Jews?"

For he realized that it was out of jealousy that NARRATOR the chief priests had handed him over. But the chief priests stirred up the crowd to have him release Barabbas for them instead. Pilate spoke to them again,

CONGREGATION "Then what do you wish me to do with the man you call the King of the Jews?"

They shouted back,

Pilate asked them,

"Why, what evil has he done?" CONGREGATION

But they shouted all the more,

"Crucify him!"

So Pilate, wishing to satisfy the crowd, released Barabbas for them; and after flogging Jesus, he handed him over to be crucified. Then the soldiers led him into the courtyard of the palace (that is, the governor's headquarters); and they called together the whole cohort. And they clothed him in a

purple cloak; and after twisting some thorns into a crown, they put it on him. And they began saluting him,

CONGREGATION NARRATOR

ON "Hail, King of the Jews!"

They struck his head with a reed, spat upon him, and knelt down in homage to him. After mocking him, they stripped him of the purple cloak and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him out to crucify him. They compelled a passer-by, who was coming in from the country, to carry his cross; it was Simon of Cyrene, the father of Alexander and Rufus. Then they brought Jesus to the place called Golgotha (which means the place of a skull). And they offered him wine mixed with myrrh; but he did not take it. And they crucified him, and divided his clothes among them, casting lots to decide what each should take. It was nine o'clock in the morning when they crucified him. The inscription of the charge against him read, "The King of the Jews." And with him they crucified two bandits, one on his right and one on his left. Those who passed by derided him, shaking their heads and saying,

CONGREGATION "Aha! You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself, and come down from the cross!"

NARRATOR In the same way the chief priests, along with the scribes, were also mocking him among themselves and saying,

CONGREGATION "He saved others; he cannot save himself. Let the Messiah, the King of Israel, come down from the cross now, so that we may see and believe."

NARRATOR	Those who were crucified with him also taunted him. When it was noon, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. At three o'clock Jesus cried out with a loud voice,
JESUS	"Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?" which means, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"
NARRATOR	When some of the bystanders heard it, they said,
CONGREGATION	·
NARRATOR	And someone ran, filled a sponge with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink, saying,
CONGREGATION	"Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come
	to take him down."
NARRATOR	Then Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last. And the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. Now when the centurion, who stood facing him, saw that in this way he breathed his last, he said,
CONGREGATION	"Truly this man was God's Son!"
NARRATOR	There were also women looking on from a distance; among them were Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James the younger and of Joses, and Salome. These used to follow him and provided for him when he was in Galilee; and there were many other women who had come up with him to Jerusalem. When evening had come, and since it was the day of Preparation, that is, the day before the sabbath, Joseph of Arimathea, a respected member of the council, who was also himself waiting expectantly for the kingdom of God, went boldly to Pilate and

asked for the body of Jesus. Then Pilate wondered if he were already dead; and summoning the centurion, he asked him whether he had been dead for some time. When he learned from the centurion that he was dead, he granted the body to Joseph. Then Joseph bought a linen cloth, and taking down the body, wrapped it in the linen cloth, and laid it in a tomb that had been hewn out of the rock. He then rolled a stone against the door of the tomb. Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of Jesus saw where the body was laid.

A profound silence is observed.

We give you thanks for pouring your divine life into our lives, as we offer our gratefulness in thanksgiving, especially for _____. *All are invited to name their petitions aloud or silently.*

We pray for all who have followed Christ along the human journey into death be united in his death and raised into his glory. We remember especially _____. *All are invited to name their petitions aloud or silently.*




God of all power, Ruler of the Universe, you are worthy of glory and praise. *Glory to you for ever and ever.*



On the night he was betrayed he took bread, said the blessing, broke the bread, and gave it to his friends, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." After supper, he took the cup of wine, gave thanks, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me." Remembering now his work of redemption, and offering to you this sacrifice of thanksgiving, *We celebrate his death and resurrection, as we await the day of his coming.*

Lord God of our Fathers and Mothers; God of Abraham and Sarah, Isaac and Rebekah, and Jacob and Rachel and Leah; God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ: Open our eyes to see your hand at work in the world about us. Deliver us from the presumption of coming to this Table for solace only, and not for strength; for pardon only, and not for renewal. Let the grace of this Holy Communion make us one body, one spirit in Christ, that we may worthily serve the world in his name. *Risen Lord, be known to us in the breaking of the Bread*.

Accept these prayers and praises, Father, through Jesus Christ our great High Priest, to whom, with you and the Holy Spirit, your Church gives honor, glory, and worship, from generation to generation. *AMEN*.
